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**FLORIDA KEYS DIVING**

**JULY 8 TO JULY 12**

Five of us are reserved to dive the middle keys for 4 days from Monday July 8 to Thursday July 11. We are booked with the Florida Keys Dive Center in Tavernier FL, and will dive most of the following wrecks: Benwood, Duane, Eagle, and Spiegel Grove. We will dive the 8:30 AM shift, and probably follow one wreck dive with a reef dive each day (except for a double on the Spiegel Grove, probably on the last dive).

Diving is \$80 to \$85 per person each day, plus tax, for a 2-tank dive. Exact price depends on destination. We are booked at the Bayside Inn for \$90 per nite plus tax (discounted rate available thru the Dive Center). Airfare in early May to Ft Lauderdale was \$316 on United Airlines (was more to Miami). A \$50 deposit signs you up.

There is room for more, both on board the boat and in the hotel. The 8<sup>th</sup> diver goes free, with the discount shared by all. Sign up, we would love to have ya.

## **LIONFISH UPDATE: THE GOOD AND BAD NEWS**

At a recent event sponsored by the Reef Environmental Education Foundation (REEF), I learned firsthand why this invasive species is so successful in the Atlantic and Caribbean. As REEF's executive director Lad Akins dissected one, its fitness was revealed. Large fat deposits allow the fish to survive long periods without food. Thirteen venomous spines line its dorsal ridge, plus two pelvic & three anal spines. A sophisticated swim bladder allows it to hover near prey, & long fins can herd it. A maw so large that it can expand to gulp animals its own size, and worst of all, hold huge rafts of eggs. Lionfish spawn every three or four days, releasing two flotillas of up to 40,000 eggs that males quickly fertilize. The egg masses float to the surface, & may have some element binding them together that keeps them from being preyed upon.

This apex predator has no competition in the Atlantic and Caribbean. No fish or crustacean eats it, despite attempts to feed captured lionfish to grouper and snapper. I've seen piscavores gobble down chopped-up lionfish (spines removed) offered by divemasters, but so far, the big fish eaters don't go after living lionfish. Indeed, there is debate about the wisdom of hand-feeding these nasty fish to the big guys. Akins showed an image of one diver who nearly lost a finger to a barracuda who had been conditioned to expect handouts. In *Invasive Lionfish: A Guide to Control and Management* (available for download at [www.REEF.org](http://www.REEF.org)), James A. Morris cites studies that make clear how problematic this practice is in conditioning fish to go after divers' fingers. Akins noted that success of these invasive animals may owe much to how they got here in the first place, probably as aquarium fishes. That means they survived capture in the Indo-Pacific, transport and probably a pet shop -- a journey that only the strong survive. In addition to their particular genetic robustness, the lionfish here seem to have far fewer parasites than their siblings in home grounds and, of course, no predators. Worst of all, no one knows yet what keeps them in check in the Indo-Pacific.

That's the bad news. The good news is that consistent culling can keep lionfish populations controlled. Every lionfish removed means more native fishes remain. How many is enough? Models vary from 15 to 95 percent removal of adult lionfish as ideal, which is virtually impossible, given the range of the creature. However, sites in the Florida Keys, Bahamas, Cozumel, Caymans, Bermuda, Puerto Rico and Bonaire with active lionfish hunting supported by marine parks and government agencies are succeeding in keeping native biomass sustainable. The other good news is that lionfish meat is delicious. As long as the creatures are not culled from a ciguatera hotspot, the lean white meat makes a mean sushi, fritter or steak. Caymanian bumper stickers tout "Put some sting in your ting" while Bermudians say "Eat 'em to beat 'em." In Bonaire, the Japanese restaurant Osaka offers the Bonairean Caterpillar, a decorative lionfish sushi garnished with avocado. REEF sells *The Lionfish Cookbook* for home chefs, and according to the New York Times, some restaurants stateside offer invasive species on their menus (Miya in New Haven, for example, has an all-invasive menu of sushi).

Sport divers can help. Many dive shops and organizations sponsor training in safe capture and handling, and lionfish derbies have removed thousands in one day. Find out more at [www.reef.org](http://www.reef.org). PADI offers a lionfish hunting certification. Roger Haug of Habitat Bonaire tells me the shop there is starting dedicated lionfish dives, that let divers search for and divemasters capture the creatures.

## **WWI GERMAN SUBMARINE HAS UNDERWATER LAKE MICHIGAN GRAVE**

May 19, 2013 (CHICAGO) (WLS) -- It is no secret that one of the major attractions at Chicago's Museum of Science and Industry is a World War II German submarine. What you may not know is that Chicago also has a World War I German submarine but it happens to be resting in a place where very few people can see it.

We are turning the clock back to 1919 which was an incredible year in Chicago's history.

There were race riots that took lives and others died when a hydrogen blimp crashed in the loop. There was a transit strike, political scandal, the Black Sox lost the series and the City of Chicago became host to a German submarine that has disappeared, but never left.

It was something of a trophy from the Great War. The German mine-laying sub U-C 97 was brought to the states in the summer of 1919. It toured some of the Great Lakes making stops in Racine, Milwaukee and its final destination Chicago. Along the way people could see, board, touch, perhaps curse this modern machine of war.

"The U-Boat was on tour. It was kind of a post-war, 'we won' tour, and so people got to go on to it and see it, and then as a condition of the armistice, it had to be sunk," Pritzker Military Library CEO Ken Clarke said.

Indeed, the order was to sink the UC-97 in deep water. In June of 1921, the sub was towed 20 to 30 miles off of Highland Park. The USS Wilmette was brought within rang, and fired her four inch guns.

"My understanding is they fired about 15 shots and they hit her about the water line and she went down pretty quick. She nose down and down she went," well-known maritime searcher Taras Lyssenko said.

And out there she rests - on the bottom of Lake Michigan.

"You know where the submarine is. I can take you right to the submarine and put you in the hatch if you want to go," Lyssenko said.

How about the aft hatch? It's there In 300 feet of water. Sleeping with the fishes. Here's a hole from one of the Willmette's shells.

Cold, fresh water has kept the sub in pretty good shape as the years have passed. Lyssenko and colleagues spent four years searching for it, and found it back in the 1990s.

In the years since, he's recovered numerous World War II fighter planes from the Lake - now restored and displayed, but Lyssenko's continuing dream is to do the same with the sub. But raising, restoring, and finding a home for it would cost, he says, upwards of 50 million dollars.

"That's huge, but the value to this city and state and country is far, multiplier. It's an exponential multiplier of the value," Lyssenko said.

"If I was a betting person, it's going to take somebody with a very particular specific interest and desire to see this piece of history come alive again," Clarke said.

And here's one more piece of history. The ship that sunk the UC-97, The USS Wilmette, had different name and purpose a few years earlier. It was the Steamship Eastland that in 1915 turned onto its side while docked in the Chicago River. Over 800 lives were lost in one of the worst maritime disasters ever.

The Eastland, later the Wilmette, was cut up for scrap after World War II. The UC-97 sits at the bottom, this appetizing, unseen pearl of history.

Pearls are expensive, and raising this one, while doable, will most definitely require "digging deep" in many respects.
